Ends in View Process On successful completion of the course, the learner will be able to: 1. i. Articulate an evidence-informed understanding of the concepts related to health inequities (e.g., autonomy, empowerment, health equity, diversity, inclusion, iustice, peace, power. powerlessness. intersectionality) relevant to individuals, groups. communities, and the nursing profession. ii. Distinguish between the historical, political, cultural, societal, and institutional root causes of oppression and power imbalances that can impact the health of individuals, groups, and communities. 2. i. Appraise the key features and merit of applying critical social theories and feminist theories within the practice of nursing. ii. Appraise relationships of dominance stemming from root causes of oppression within the context of critical social and feminist theories affecting vulnerable populations and the nursing profession. 3. i. Apply empowerment theory through professional trusting interactions with client and others in a variety of contexts (e.g., simulated and/or direct client interactions) to address and

respond to health inequities.

The intent of this course is to examine health issues within a holistic framework, which considers the individual, the community, and society. Two theoretical frameworks (feminist and critical social theory) will be used for analyses of specific health issues. Written and verbal critical analysis and commentary on the impact of social, economic, and political structures on health are key components of the course. The student will also apply knowledge gained in other nursing courses to particular health issues and demonstrate a comprehensive and integrated understanding of health assessment as it involves issues of empowerment.
