<p>Entry-level registered nurses are expected to seek and integrate relevant knowledge for use in the provision of nursing care (CNO, 2014). Thereby, this praxis-oriented course begins with students asking a structured patient-focused question to guide their exploration of nursing knowledge. Students are invited to participate in learning activities aimed at promoting their critical thinking, critical inquiry, and information/research literacy. Enactment of knowledge and competent application of skills are foundational for the evaluative components of the course.</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Articulate the historical and evolving trends of nursing research and connections to nursing practice (e.g., knowledge generation, dissemination, translation, utilization) within the Canadian context. 2. Describe the structure of nursing research with an emphasis on the predominant paradigms. 3. Explain the purposeful sequencing of activities within the nursing research process. 4. Formulate a contemporary, clinical question relevant to nursing practice through an auditable exploration of professional, academic, and non-academic data sources. 5. Filter, abstract, organize, and summarize published primary and secondary research evidence guided by a focused clinical question relative to nursing.
