Course Description:	FRN102 is a continuation course that revisits the fundamentals of the French grammar and lexicon learned in FRN101 and deepens the practice of more complex grammar features, yet at an upper-introductory level. Class activities promote the practice of writing, reading, and listening comprehension, and French conversation. The course exposes learners to both authentic as well as instructional materials. Metacognitive and metalinguistic reflection helps learners to identify common error patterns and interference of their own native language and to consolidate their learning and transfer it to new situations. The course also explores materials and events that represent la Francophonie, in general, and la culture qubcoise in particular. Regular class attendance and weekly lab practice are essential to succeed in the course.
