<b>Course Description:</b>	This course focuses upon ethical issues and dilemmas faced by individuals as citizens and as professionals. It helps students to clarify their values and establish a framework for ethical decision making. Ethical issues of a general nature, which relate to a wide variety of concerns are examined. The student will investigate the ethical codes of their chosen vocation and apply ethical analysis models to dilemmas which typify those often encountered in the profession.
