Course Description:	<p>In this course, students will apply and build upon skills developed in IVT112. Through growth and practice of self-reflection, exploration of self-concept, and affirmative communication skills, students will develop capacity for independence, self-advocacy and self-determination in field placement, the workplace, and community.</p> <p>Students will explore employment opportunities, identify and communicate goals, skills, strengths, challenges, and barriers in the workplace. Students will combine skills and strategies to solve real-world problems, develop comprehensive action plans, and evaluate progress. This course will reinforce rights and responsibilities of employees and persons with disabilities. Learning activities will relate directly to co-requisite field placement course IVT131 Field Placement II.</p>
