Course Description:	In this course, students will apply and build upon skills developed in IVT112. Through growth and practice of self-reflection, exploration of self-concept, and affirmative communication skills, students will develop capacity for independence, self-advocacy and self-determination in field placement, the workplace, and community. Students will explore employment opportunities, identify and communicate goals, skills, strengths, challenges, and barriers in the workplace. Students will combine skills and strategies to solve real-world problems, develop comprehensive action plans, and evaluate progress. This course will reinforce rights and responsibilities of employees and persons with disabilities. Learning activities will relate directly to co-requisite field placement course IVT131 Field Placement II.
