PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

The purpose of this subject is to provide the student with the knowledge of the principles of law, particularly commercial law which regulates business, to develop in the student an understanding of these rules, to develop in him the skill of recognizing, classifying, clarifying, and analyzing business legal problems, to apply the law and reason to a legal solution, and in so doing develop an understanding of a positive attitude toward the judicial process and its complexities.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT (GRADING METHOD):

- 1. Basis: The student's grade will be determined by the administration of maximum of eight (8) tests and the completion of a maximum of three (3) assignments, all of equal value.
- 2. Grading: A letter grading of A, B, C, I or R will be used to indicate the achievement or value of the student's work.
- 3. Grade Interpretation:
- A This grade means that the student has an exceptional understanding of, and/or ability with, the portion of the subject assessed, to such an extent that he has a complete or near complete grasp of, or ability with, the material or work, and thus understands more than eighty-five percent or able to perform more than eight-five percent of the work tested.
- B This grade means that the student has a high degree of understanding of, and/or ability with, the portion of the subject assessed, and thus understands more than seventy percent or able to perform more than seventy percent of the work tested.
- C This grade means that the student has a basic understanding of all the elementary essentials of the portion of the subject assessed, and/or able to perform all the basic elementary essentials of the work tested, and thus understands more than fifty-eight percent or able to perform more than fifty-eight percent of the work tested.
- I This grade means that the student does not have the basic understanding or ability necessary for a C grade, and that he will therefore be required to re-study or be retrained and be re-assessed, and that the aforesaid must be completed within a time specified, during the instructional sessions, that is, before the make-up period assigned by the college, and that if the said re-assessment is satisfactory, no grade greater than a "C" will be granted, and failure to do so may require the

- student to make one final effort in the time set aside by the College for what is presently called the "make-up period," provided he has no more than two "I" gradings remaining in his total semester assessments, and similarily if successful no grade greater than a "C" will be granted.
- R This grade means that the student has not achieved a minimum of a "C" grade in all his assignments within the times aforesaid, or has more than two "I" grades outstanding by the end of the instructional sessions for that semester' and or has demonstrated a lack serious intention during the semester in acquiring a basic understanding or ability.

NOTE: 1. There will be no merging of I grades.

2. Correct spelling and grammar in all test papers and written submissions is essential to effectively communicate proof of understanding of the subject content. Any serious frequency of spelling errors, particularly of subject terminology, or of grammar errors will probably reduce the receiver's or marker's ability to accurately interpret the communications, and thus should be avoided, and may also therefore justify the lowering of the mark by one grade or more, and even possibly the granting of an I grade.
