Course Description:	Child and Youth Care Methods I is an introductory course to the field of Child and Youth Care and to Community Practicum. Students will achieve a beginning familiarity with the body of knowledge, skills, and attitudes that are uniquely those of the competent Child and Youth Care practitioner. Child and Youth Care is an established profession with its own history. It operates within a Code of Ethics and has both provincial (Ontario Association of Child and Youth Counsellors OACYC,) and national associations. Along with the above, in this course, we will explore three central themes: the child at risk, the environment or settings that serve the child, and the Child and Youth Care practitioner as an agent of therapeutic change. This course will also prepare students for fieldwork experiences in educational settings. We introduce the skills and issues concerning observation, reporting, policies and ethics, and confidentiality.

	<ol> <li>Assignments may be modified by reducing the amount of information required while maintaining general concepts.</li> <li>Some assignments may be eliminated depending on the number of assignments required in the particular course.</li> </ol>
	The Learning Specialist may:
	<ol> <li>Use a question/answer format instead of essay/research format</li> <li>Propose a reduction in the number of references required for an assignment</li> <li>Assist with groups to ensure that student comprehends his/her role within the group</li> <li>Require an extension on due dates due to the fact that some students may require additional time to process information</li> <li>Formally summarize articles and assigned readings to isolate main points for the student</li> <li>Use questioning techniques and paraphrasing to assist in student comprehension of an assignment</li> </ol>
