I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to provide students with the level of computer literacy needed to function in today's workplace. Utilizing a hands-on approach, internet, email, the concepts of microcomputer operating systems, and word processing applications will be introduced. A personal email account will be used throughout the course to facilitate good communications between students and faculty and simulate the modern work environment.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

- II. Upon successful completion of this course, the CICE student, along with the assistance of an Integrative Educational Assistant, will demonstrate the basic ability to:
- 1. Access and navigate the software required to communication with coworkers using e-mail and browse the Internet.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Open an email program.
- Compose and send email messages to others on the same system and elsewhere.
- View, store, sort, delete, and print incoming messages.
- Reply to and forward incoming messages.
- Create and use distribution lists.
- Store commonly used addresses.
- Create and use distribution lists.
- Create a signature file.
- Attach files to email messages.
- Create and utilize email folders.
- Open and exit an Internet browser (MS Internet Explorer).
- Recognize and use the hyperlinks.
- Key URLs to reach specific web pages.
- Use the history feature.
- Create and organize Favorites.
- Create a folder; move items into a folder; and delete a folder.
- Print and save web pages.
- Perform simple searches using a variety of search engines.

This module will constitute 30% of the course grade.

2. Demonstrate proficiency in operating a common word processing software package to prepare standard business documents.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Open and exit from MS Word 2000.
- Define wordwrap, overtype, and insert mode.
- Move, insert, replace, select, highlight, and delete text.
- Scroll and navigate in a document.
- Check spelling and grammar in a document.
- Use AutoCorrect, Thesaurus, and Office Assistant.
- Preview and print a document.
- Create a document using both a template and a wizard.
- Apply fonts, effects, and animation to text.
- Use Format Painter and repeat a command.
- Indent text; change line and paragraph spacing.
- Insert bullets, numbering, and symbols.
- Set all types of tabs.
- Add borders and shading to text; apply styles; as well as create an outline-style numbered list.
- Find and replace text.
- Cut, copy, and paste text; as well as collect paste text.
- Insert a page break, insert and modify pages numbers; change margins; change page orientation; and change views.
- Vertically align text.
- Create, modify, format, move, and apply borders and shading to a table.
- Change column widths and row heights.
- 3. Demonstrate proficiency in using an up-to-date operating system for microcomputers.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Identify the objects on the Windows XP desktop.
- Practice mouse functions such as pointing, clicking, selecting, and right-clicking.
- Use the Windows XP Start button to run software programs.
- Explore the Windows XP Help system.
- Identify and use the controls in a window.
- Switch between programs using the taskbar.
- Use Windows XP controls such as menus, toolbars, list boxes, scroll bars, radio buttons, tabs, and check boxes.
- Format a disk.
- Enter, select, insert, and delete text using WordPad.

Computers in Human Services

- Create and save a file; open and edit a file; and print a file.
- Move and copy a file; rename a file; and delete a file.
- Create a data disk.
- View the list of files on disk.
- Make a backup of a floppy disk.
- Create and organize folders.
- Navigate through the Windows XP hierarchy.

This learning outcome will constitute 20% of the course grade.

Students are expected to be present to write all tests during regularly scheduled classes.

If a student is not able to be present for the test, s/he must call and leave a voicemail message prior to the time of the test, in order for alternate arrangements to be made. (Call Ext. 674.)

If the student has not contacted the professor, the student will receive a mark of "0" on that test.

One hundred percent completion of all assignments is expected. Late assignments will not be accepted. The assignments are due at the beginning of the class on the due date.

A disk labeled with the student's name, professor's name, and the course name MUST be available with the assignment. At the professor's discretion, disks will be checked. Students are advised to maintain at LEAST one backup of all files. A lost or damaged diskette will not be an acceptable reason for a late or incomplete assignment.

All work must be labeled with the student's name and the project information on each page. All work must be submitted in a labeled folder complete with a plastic disk pocket.

Computers in Human Services

During testing, the program's on-line help may be available. Tests will **not** be "open book." Students must ensure that they have the appropriate tools to do the test (i.e. diskettes, pencil, pen, etc.).

During tests, students are expected to keep their eyes on their own work.

Test papers will be returned to the student after grading in order to permit verification of the results and to review the tests. However, the student will be required to return all test papers to the professor who will keep them on file for one year.

Keyboarding proficiency is encouraged. Students who are unable to keyboard with a touch type technique are encouraged to use (or purchase) the *All the Right Type* typing tutor software located on the network and in The Learning Centre.

Academic dishonesty will result in a grade of zero (0) on the assignment or test for all involved parties.

Regular attendance is expected so the professor can observe work and provide guidance as necessary.

VII. PRIOR LEARNING ASSESSMENT:

Students who wish to apply for advanced credit in the course should consult the professor. Credit for prior learning will be given upon successful completion of a challenge exam or portfolio.

VIII. DIRECT CREDIT TRANSFERS:

Students who wish to apply for direct credit transfer (advanced standing) should obtain a direct credit transfer form from the Dean's secretary. Students will be required to provide a transcript and course outline related to the course in question.

CICE Modifications:

Preparation and Participation

- 1. An Integrative Educational Assistant will attend class with the student(s) to assist with inclusion in the class and to take notes.
- 2. Students will receive support in and outside of the classroom (i.e. tutoring, assistance with homework and assignments, preparation for exams, tests and guizzes.)
- 3. Study notes will be geared to test content and style which will match with modified learning outcomes.
- 4. Although the Integrative Educational Assistant may not attend all classes with the student(s), support will always be available. When the Integrative Educational Assistant does attend classes he/she will remain as inconspicuous as possible.

CICE Modifications:

A. Tests may be modified in the following ways:

- 1. Tests which require essay answers may be modified to short answers.
- 2. Short answer questions may be changed to multiple choice or the question may be simplified so the answer will reflect a basic understanding.
- 3. Tests which use fill in the blank format may be modified to include a few choices for each question, or a list of choices for all questions. This will allow the student to match or use visual clues.
- 4. Tests in the T/F or multiple choice format may be modified by rewording or clarifying statements into layman's or simplified terms. Multiple choice questions may have a reduced number of choices.

B. Tests will be written in the Learning Assistance Centre with assistance from an Integrative Educational Assistant.

The Integrative Educational Assistant may:

- 1. Read the test question to the student.
- 2. Paraphrase the test question without revealing any key words or definitions.
- 3. Transcribe the student's verbal answer.
- 4. Test length may be reduced and time allowed to complete test may be increased.

C. Assignments may be modified in the following ways:

- 1. Assignments may be modified by reducing the amount of information required while maintaining general concepts.
- 2. Some assignments may be eliminated depending on the number of assignments required in the particular course.

The Integrative Educational Assistant may:

- 1. Use a question/answer format instead of essay/research format
- 2. Propose a reduction in the number of references required for an assignment
- 3. Assist with groups to ensure that student comprehends his/her role within the group
- 4. Require an extension on due dates due to the fact that some students may require additional time to process information
- 5. Formally summarize articles and assigned readings to isolate main points for the student
- 6. Use questioning techniques and paraphrasing to assist in student comprehension of an assignment

D. Evaluation:

Is reflective of modified learning outcomes.
