COURSE DESCRIPTION

During the two semesters students v/ill participate in a variety of facilities offering services to -the mentally retarded. Throughout the two semesters the students will rotate at approximately four v;eek intervals, in the following' types of settings:

- a) Schools: nursery level through high school for the mentally retarded
- b) Sheltered workshop: community based
- c) Specialized service in the field of mental retardation
- d) Nursing home for the aged
- e) Group homes for the mentally retarded
- f) Furthermore, they will be involved in Recreation and. Leisure time activities on a voluntary basis.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

COURSE OUTLINE

- a) For the first week of both semesters seminars will be held at the college. During this v/eek general information will be given to the students.
- b) During the remainder of both semesters each student will spend equal time in a number of facilities for the mentally retarded.
- c) Seminars will be held regularly.
- d) During the last week of both semesters students will again remain on campus, attending seminar sessions as deemed necessary by the instructor.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS & EVALUATION

- a) 80% attendance at field placements and seminars.
- b) Demonstrate competence in all general objectives outlined for both courses,
- c) Demonstrate competence in all objectives outlined for a specific facility.
- d) Demonstrate ability to assimilate and synthesize observations and information from other sources.

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- e) Complete all reports and forms requested by instructor.
- f) Keep a notebook that will be checked throughout both->> semesters.
- g) Grading:

The student will be graded*on a "Credit" - "No-credit" basis. If a student fails a module he/she will have to repeat the module in order to gain credit.

Note:

Because the MRC program involves direct service to people in need of skilled help, if the faculty agrees that a student is not suited for the field, he or she will be asked to transfer from the curriculum regardless of academic record.
