NATURE OF COURSE: In general this course will present the student with an understanding attitude of the development of societies attitude about human sexuality. More specifically the course will foster an awareness and comprehension of human sexuality through examination of typical and atypical behaviour and attitudes about sexuality. The implications of this in working with disturbed or troubled youth will be a major area of focus.

GOALS: The principal goal of this course is to present to the student a body of facts and perception in the area of human sexuality. In conjunction with this, it is anticipated that the student will explore his/her own 'sexual' values and attitudes and reach an understanding of how they influence the helping relationship.

OBJECTIVES:

- a) To become aware of basic human anatomy and physiology.
- b) To examine the issue of sex-education for children.
- c) To study sex-role learning.
- d) To study the implication (physiological and psychological) of puberty.
- e) To become aware of the methods of contraception.
- f) To study the physical and emotional complexities of pregnancy and childbirth.
- g) To examine the issue of abortion.
- h) To study the impact of personal crisis i.e. incest, rape, and their implications to treatment.

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- i) To recognize and formulate methods of dealing with appropriate and inappropriate sexual behaviour in the disturbed child.
- j) To examine variations in sexual behaviour i.e. homosexuality.
- k) To examine legal, moral and ethical issues around sexual decision making with clients.
