NATURE OF COURSE, AND OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to build upon the student's knowledge of theory and technique in Child Care Work. Four therapeutic approaches and philosophies will be examined with emphasis upon application in real-life situations from the student's experiences. Variables affecting treatment implementation will be identified. The Major emphasis will be on an emphatic view of the youngster, the family and the Child Care Worker as a professional agent of change.

The course will include study of child abuse, with emphasis on the treatment of the abused child.

A section of the course will be devoted to a study of the treatment of the Young Offender. One goal of the course is to develop in the student an ability to incorporate theory in the design and application of treatment programmes with young people. An ability to research materials to support programme ideas will be expected. The case study method will be employed.

At all times, students will be expected to apply the skills learned in inter-personal relations, group process, psychological and child care work theory, as befits the "senior-level" nature of this course.

REQUIREMENTS:

- a) Case analysis and treatment planning. There will be two take home cases that will require a clearly written (or typed) analysis and treatment plan. At least one of these will involve a written critique from a classmate. A Third case will be a group project (groups of 2 or 3 members) done in class. A one-week advance notice will be provided in each case. More details will be provided in class. Length of each report - approximately 800-1000 words. References are expected, and reporting style must be according to APA format.
- b) One Journal Article Presentation:
A summary of a recent (within 4 years) article from a psychological, counselling or child care work journal, the topic of which is to be chosen by the student (in an area of particular interest to the student, but must relate to child, adolescent or family development, psychology,

or treatment). Approximately 1/3 of the summary is to synthesize the content of the article, the remaining 2/3 is to be the reactions and opinions of the student.

Oral Presentations:

- in class
- 5 to 10 minutes for presentation
- 5 minutes for class discussions (led by the presenter)
- 5 marks for accuracy and clarity in the oral
- 5 marks for style of presentation and discussion

Written Report:

- approximately 2 pages
- content and opinions should be clearly identified as such
- may be written in point form
- no references required
