COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to introduce the student to the study of contemporary social issues. These issues will be examined in light of their repercussions on our society and how they impact on the individual and his/her family structure. Issues of etiology, remediation, education and prevention will be examined as they apply to the helping professional.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. To create an awareness of the contemporary social issues which may have an impact on the students as individuals and as members of a family group, community, and larger society.
- To begin to examine issues of causes (etiology), remediation, education, and prevention as they apply to the various social issues and as they relate to the helping professional.
- 3. To investigate adaptive or maladaptive responses to the contemporary social issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. A seminar is to be presented by each student(s) on the topic and date assigned. Each seminar is expected to include outside research as well as a summary of the information that is found in the related chapter. Each seminar is to include a typed bibliography which is to be handed in. The seminar itself does not have to be submitted in writing. Each seminar must be at least 30 minutes in length, with at least a 15-minute discussion period following the oral presentation.
- 2. A critique of about 250 words on a recent article in a newspaper or magazine which deals with some current aspect of a social problem is to be submitted during the semester. The deadline for this assignment to be accepted is the 2nd class in March. Late assignments will not be accepted.

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COURSE REQUIREMENTS (cont'd)

- 3. Participation in group discussions is expected upon completion of fellow classmates' seminar presentations.
- 4. There will be two tests during the course one mid-term and one final. The dates of the tests will be announced.
- 5. Any other short assignments that may be handed out during the semester.
