#### PHILOSOPHY/GOALS

Child Care Practice I will serve as an introductory course to the field of Child Care. The basic philosophy permeating this course is that there is a set of attitudes, specific knowledge, skills and proficiencies that are uniquely those of the competent Child and Youth Worker. As a group, we will explore three central themes: the child - the settings- the Child and Youth Worker.

#### STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the development of child and youth work profession relative to human service delivery system.
- 2. List and describe skills and attitudinal factors pertinent to this field.
- 3. Identify and describe employment settings for CYW
- 4. Define specific child management skills pertinent to various treatment modalities with specific focus on residential and educational settings.
- 5. Discuss factors indicative of therapeutic intervention.
- 6. Demonstrate a familiarity with the legislation pertinent to the field of Child and Youth Work.

- 1. History and Development of the Profession.
- 2. Current status of Profession
- 3. Concept of Emotional Disturbance
- 4. Impact of Exceptional Needs on Family and Community

- 7. Legislative Directions and Boundaries in CYW
