I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will address different approaches, techniques, and strategies for building a sustainable economic, environmental and socially integrated system on a personal, communal and global scale. Students will critically assess/examine underlying challenges and potential solutions for cultivating the positive development of long lasting peace. Special emphasis will be placed on the interdependence of the environment, human rights, equitable human development and peace.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Discuss the importance of the integrated relationship between the economy, society and the environment.

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Explain the links between social, economic and environmental security
- Consider the concepts of biodiversity and ecology in relation to sustainability
- Outline the relationship between personal health, community progress and ecological wellbeing
- Research sustainable approaches to economics and trade
- 2. Analyse and evaluate current challenges to sustainability.

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Review society's dependence on oil consumption and identify energy alternatives
- Research the effects of climate changes on ecosystems, landscapes, and social relations
- Assess the consequences and challenges of global population growth
- 3. Analyse and assess various techniques and strategies for building a sustainable economic, environmental and socially integrated system.

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Consider underlying principles of sustainability from western and non-western perspectives
- Evaluate the advantages and disadvantages of renewable energy sources and initiatives
- Consider the role of technology for supporting sustainable development initiatives

4. Apply assessment models of sustainability to local and/or global agencies, organizations and initiatives.

Potential Elements of Performance:

- Consider various models of sustainable development by analyzing structures and roles of different organizations and community projects
- Choose appropriate evaluation mechanisms for sustainability analysis
- Critiquecase studies using a sustainable development perspective
