Course Philosophy

To provide the student with a practical working knowledge in the area of infant and toddler care and learning.

Course Objectives

- This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the physical and emotional needs of the individual infant and/or toddler in both their home and a group setting.
- 2. To enable the students to compare and evaluate some of the current series in research in the area and to develop a personal philosophy toward infant/toddler care and learning.

Course Goals

The student will:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to recognize and meet the physical and emotional needs of an individual infant and/or toddler.
- 2. Plan, prepare and present a learning device to the class; complete a written report on this. One for an infant and one for a toddler.
- 3. Complete a written program with evidence of developmental learning materials and situations for a group care centre. (2,000 words, typewritten, with schedules and diagrams).
- 4. Complete a seven-page paper giving a detailed comparison of group and home care programs for infant and toddler. Preferences may be stated, but they must be substantiated by references to reading, class information, journal or film. Title page, index, and bibliography and footnotes must be included.
