Course Philosophy

To provide the student with a practical working knowledge in the area of infant and toddler care and learning.

Course Objectives

- This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the physical 1. and emotional needs of the individual infant and/or toddler in both their home and a group setting.
- To enable the students to compare and evaluate some of the current series in research in the area and to develop a personal philosophy toward infant/toddler care and learning.

- Plan, prepare and present a learning device to the class; complete a · written report on this. One for an infant and one for a toddler.
- Complete a written program with evidence of developmental learning 3. materials and situations for a group care centre. (2,000 words, typewritten, with schedules and diagrams).
- Demonstrate the ability to plan, implement and report on a 3 hour program for Infants and Toddlers at Emmanuel Church - showing understanding of both individual and group needs in this situation.
