#### Course Description:

A study of socialization processes, family dynamics and the various child-rearing practices found in our own and other cultures. Socialogical factors, such as social change and poverty, which affect family life will be considered in developing a view of family life education for contemporary society.

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#### Course Philosophy:

This course is designed to help students to gain an understanding of the concept and processes of socialization and how they influence the developmen of the child in the family.

#### Course Goals:
