COURSE PHILOSOPHY: This course is designed to assist students to gain therapeutic, less stereotyped attitudes towards abusers; a feeling for the importance of working with other professionals and with community groups; and self-confidence in their ability to respond appropriately in abuse cases.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- To provide students with basic "background knowledge" on the subject of child abuse - eg. definitional problems, current estimates of the incidence of child abuse and a multiple - factor model for understanding the causes of child abuse.
- 2.) To prepare students who will be working with children and their families for their critical role in the family identification and referral of families in which abuse is suspected or deemed to be a high risk.
- 3.) To prepare students to work in a multi-disciplinary effort around issues of assessment and treatment.
