COURSE PHILOSOPHY

Child abuse intervention and treatment are now generally seen as the responsibility of every individual. Wife battering also needs to take the forefront as a crucial social issue. By examining the ways that families resolve conflict students will learn that non-violent behaviours can replace dysfunctional patterns. Teaching constructive ways of coping with stress, anger and conflict can become a deterrent to the family violence phenomenon.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- To make students aware of the magnitude of the phenomena of wife and of child abuse. Definitions, incidence and causal factors will be discussed.
- 2. To understand why women remain in abusive relationships.
- 3. To examine treatment issues for battered women, for battering husbands and for children who witness or experience violence.
- 4. To review current treatment modalities found effective in producing an end to violence.
- 5. To prepare students who will be working with children and their families, for their critical role in the early identification, treatment and referral of families in which abuse is suspected or deemed to be a high risk.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENT

Choice of the following for 40% of total grade:

1. Professional Submission

Situation: A committee of the provincial legislature is coming to your

area to study the prevention of wife abuse or of child abuse. the committee will make recommendations to the government that will become the foundation of government

policy and new legislation.

Assignment: In a group or individually (at the discretion of your

instructor), prepare a brief submission (written or oral) that

contains the following:

1. the reasons for your personal and/or professional concern

about the problem.

2. a brief descriptive background. (researched)

3. <u>specific recommendations</u> that could be implemented and a

description of how these recommendations might serve to

reduce the incidence of wife or child abuse.

2. Research Paper

Students are required to submit a research paper, either typewritten or on tape, which addresses as any <u>one</u> of the questions posed under Self-Evaluation for any of the four units in the Family Violence Module or b) any prevention or treatment issue related to one of the forms of child abuse.

The paper is to be 10 typewritten pages in length (or 60 min. tape) student's ability to integrate course material with personal/professional views.

3. Project:

a. Research various programs, e.g. Sara Society or Child Abuse

Outreach Prevention, which are designed to teach young children about appropriate and inappropriate touching and/or what to do when abused. Summarize these

programs.

b. Design an appropriate two week curriculum which could be

used with preschool children in a day nursery setting.
