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I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This is an introduction to programming course using Visual Basic.NET.

Once the student becomes familiar with the Visual Basic programming environment and the basics of the language, the student will be ready to create their own programs, including programs for GIS. In doing so, the course will cover objects, properties, events, code development and testing. As a final topic, an introduction to the Python programming language will be examined.
