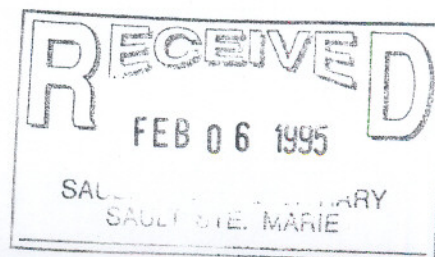

I. Philosophy/Goals:

This course gives a special emphasis on geographic patterns of the usage of our earth's surface. There is a concentration on such areas as the reasons for human migration, the geometry of urban place location, as well as manufacturing and agricultural patterns of location. Human activities are examined regarding activity spaces, mental images and maps, as well as time budgets, and the transportation linkages that connect all these activities together.

II. Student Performance Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course the student will:

1. define and discuss the major components of human geography.
2. understand the reasons for population locations within a given area, fluctuations of these populations over time periods, and reasons for human patterns of migration.
3. discuss the roles of culture, language, religion and politics on the environment.
4. outline the reasons for agricultural, industrial, and urban locations in various societies.
5. be able to discuss how humans have impacted on their environment and perceive what may be expected in future utilization of resources.
