I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course gives students the flexibility of exploring an area of the arts that is of individual interest. Under the guidance of the professor, students will be given the opportunity to research a specific topic in the arts, develop a proposal for a plan of study and action, and determine a final assignment. Students' current experience on an arts-based project may be considered as an aspect of the independent study. Final assignments may include a research paper, report, creative portfolio or creative project.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Investigate and determine an area of interest in the arts in which they would like to further study.

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Gather information from a variety of sources to determine the area of the arts which would best meet their interests
- Self-reflect and determine which area would best fit their interests and goals
- Identify a creative project that would meet allow them to learn more about their area of artistic interests

2. Research, gather and apply information to complete the final creative project

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Use tools such as interviews, libraries, and databases to gather appropriate, accurate and useful information that will aid in the completion of the creative project

3. Give a well-organized and effective presentation of the final project

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Organize a presentation showcasing the creative project
- Deliver an effective, dynamic presentation demonstrating the goals of the project

4. Produce a well-organized, coherent, effective creative project

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Determine the goals of the creative project
- Choose a method (research paper, video,) to best meet the goals and objectives of the project
- Produce, and effective project meeting the goals of the project

5. Produce a variety of well- written documents to support the creative project

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Write a logical, coherent letter of intent determining the goals of the project and
- Write a logical, coherent, plan of action and time line for completion of project
- Produce and submit progress reports throughout the semester
- Complete an individual written evaluation at the end of the project to determine its success

3. Writing a Proposal and Plan of Action
4. Writing Progress Reports
5. Presentation Skills
6. Self Evaluation
