I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a hands-on class that requires students to digitally develop more advanced illustration techniques. Students will be asked to analyze various problems and present digital illustrations that offer insightful and provocative editorial solutions. All illustration projects will be developed as complete designs. These complete designs will be both editorial and advertising specific. Students will also develop illustrations that can be animated or digitally manipulated.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

1. Demonstrate the ability to scan traditional illustrations and convert them to vector based drawings

Potential Elements of the Performance:

- Utilization of Adobe Illustrator for development of vector based drawings
- Refinement of pen tool usage within Illustrator working environment.
- Development of custom brushes for calligraphic illustration and design

2. Understand and develop stylistic illustrative techniques. <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>:

- Understand and utilize naturalistic illustrative techniques
- Develop individual stylistic illustrative methods
- Development of animated or sequential illustrations
- Develop the ability to express the purpose of specific design or illustrative interpretation
- Develop advanced usage of Photoshop as an illustrative tool <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>:

 Develop an effective understanding of the basic drawing tools within the Photoshop environment
 - Develop proper file formats for various media placements
- 4. **Develop finished illustrations for digital manipulation** <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>:
 - Understand the limits and possibilities for digital manipulation.

5. <u>Appropriate time management and studio habits</u> <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>:

• Develop organizational skills such as scheduling, prioritizing and time management within specific project oriented boundaries

III. TOPICS:

- 1. Digital Media design and illustration instruments and materials
- 2. Figurative representation and stylization
- 3. Illustration for packaging and point of purchase
- 4. Sequential illustration and basic animation
- 5 Story boarding
- 6 Compositional development

IV. REQUIRED RESOURCES/TEXTS/MATERIALS:

No textbooks required

Research:

Students should bring their basic art supplies as purchased in their art supply kit to every class. Students will be given advance notice as to additional materials on a per project basis. Students must come to class with the proper materials to work in class weekly.

Students are encouraged to use extensive research methods for obtaining proper visual references in the brainstorm/ideation process for design problem-solving. Research materials are welcome in the classroom to assist in the development of images. However, the direct copying of research reference is strictly prohibited by copy infringement laws. Wherever possible, the student should use real life visual reference rather than relying on existing two-dimensional imagery.

V. EVALUATION PROCESS/GRADING SYSTEM:

VII. PRIOR LEARNING ASSESSMENT:

DEDUCTIONS - LATES & INCOMPLETES:

Lates:

- An assignment is considered late if it is not submitted at the time and on the date specified by the instructor.

- A Late assignment will be penalized by a 5 % deduction for each week it is late. The total penalty will be deducted from the final grade eg 3 weeks late = 15 % deduction from the final grade.

Maximum grade for a Late assignment is "C".

- A Late assignment which is not executed to a minimum C (satisfactory) level will be assigned an Incomplete grade with additional penalties outlined below.

Incompletes:

- An Incomplete grade is assessed to an assignment which has not been executed to a minimum satisfactory (C grade) level or in which the directions have not been followed correctly.

- An Incomplete assignment must be entirely re-done or corrected according to the instructor's specific instructions and re-submitted within one week.

An Incomplete assignment will be penalized by a 5 % deduction from the final grade.
Maximum grade for an Incomplete assignment is " C ".

Incomplete assignments not submitted within the one week timeframe will be subject to 5 % late deductions for each week they are overdue.

Homework:

Because this course is 6 credits delivered in a 3 hour supervised studio format, the equivalent of 6 hour per week minimum of homework will be expected outside the scheduled studio class

Preliminary Studies:

- All assignments require preliminary or intermediate steps such as thumbnails, roughs, and preliminary comprehensive layouts.

- These intermediate steps are evaluated according to criteria established by the instructor and submitted according to established timelines. The final grade for each assignment will be an average of the grade achieved for all stages of the assignment. This reinforces the importance of the preliminary stages of each project.

- Preliminary studies which are late or incomplete will be subject to the same penalty deductions as final presentations. Maximum grade for late or incomplete preliminary studies is "C".

ATTENDANCE:

- 80% attendance is mandatory. A **maximum** of **3 classes absent** (total 6 hours) will be tolerated.

- There will be a **10 % penalty** deduction from the final grade for <u>each class missed</u> <u>after the maximum allowed of 3</u>; a **5 % penalty** deduction will be assessed for half classes missed (before or after the break).

- A student who arrives <u>any time after the class has begun</u> will be assessed a **late** penalty of a half class missed - **5** % deduction from final grade.

MIDTERM ("S" or "U"):

Midterm grades are "S" for Satisfactory progress, and "U" for Unsatisfactory progress. Unsatisfactory progress in two or more courses requires an appointment with the Program Co-ordinator or the School's Dean.
