Course Objective

Simply put, the main objective of the course is to present an academically sound introduction to the study of Sociology. Obviously, sociological terms must be used in discussing the subject, but these will be kept at a minimum. Except for the necessary use of such terminology there would seem to be no intrinsic merit in an obtuse term when a plain word is available. In fact, the excitement of Sociology is best communicated in easily comprehended English which conveys a message on any subject more effectively than does ornate and turgid phraseology. In sum, it is my aim to present a humanized version of Sociology.
