COURSE CONTENT:

Nursing diagnosis which involves complex problems involving several adaptive modes, where the focus is assisting the client to adapt to a new level of functioning.

Life threatening and long-term maladaptive states will also be considered.

Example: Component of Physiological Mode - Activity

Nursing Diagnosis - Actual/potential impaired mobility (long-term) (neurological).

- Dependence on devices for mobility (life-long - wheelchair, braces)
