Group dynamics will be examined and opportunities to practice as an effective group member will be provided.

II. LEAKNIHG <u>OUTCOMES</u>:

In this course, many learning activities are designed to foster collaborate learning in small groups. In order for the learner to develop the ability to critically think, reflect and integrate new information, the learner must engage in active dialogue with colleagues and the teacher. It is therefore to the learner's benefit that the learner attend and participate in class.

- 2. adopt caring behaviours when interacting with others.
- 3. demonstrate effective interpersonal skills with people from diverse backgrounds.
- 4. evaluate self and others using group process theory.
