- 1. examined the concepts of health and healing and the relationship to human development.
- 2. examined beliefs and practices which promote a healthy lifestyle.
- 3. assessed health throughout the lifespan, from toddler to adult, within the family context.
- 4. practiced basic nursing skills to maintain and promote health in the Health Sciences Resource Centre and the nursing practice setting.
- 5. applied interpersonal skills in a caring manner.
- 6. applied analytical thinking skills in class discussions and written assignments to plan and provide safe care.

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III. <u>TOPICS</u> IQ BE CQYEREB:

The content will be covered under the following concepts:

- Practicum:

Week 1-14

Students will be focusing on experiences in the community to explore the concepts of growth and development, families health, health assessment, health promotion and communication.

Week <u>15-16</u>

Students will be assigned to a two-week consolidation period in a nursing practice setting.
