Course Title: Art of Ribbon Work FSA113

I. PHILOSOPHY AND GOALS

This week-end accredited course is designed to provide students with the opportunity to learn about the art of ribbon work with an experienced craftsperson. Teachings relevant to ribbon work (the meanings behind the colours, for example) will be provided while the students design and create their own ribbon work garment. The Ojibwe words for ribbon work related materials will be given when possible during this course.

II. STUDENT OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

Identify Anishinaabe words pertaining to creating a ribbon work article.

Identify a variety of articles that may be created using ribbon work.

Design and create an article or garment in a specific style of ribbon work.

Identify teachings from which the ribbon work garment originated.

Upon the completion of the workshop, the student is responsible to submit a minimum of two to three page **ASSIGNMENT** responding to the workshop to the Art Journey instructor. This paper should include:

*Anishnaabe words pertaining to ribbon work
*Types of material used to create ribbon work garment
*Description of preliminary design and creation of ribbon work garment
* Relevancy of teachings at a personal level (what did you learn from the experience?)
