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PROFESSIONAL GROWTH I COURSE NAME

I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to acquaint students with the nursing profession. The course will provide students with the opportunity to explore the nurse's role including the student's personal values about nursing and the diversity of occupational roles for registered nurses and registered practical nurses. Students will investigate the evolution of nursing and its influence on nursing education. Nursing process is introduced. Students will also explore several ways of knowing and examine personal assumptions about learning. Critical thinking will be introduced and utilized in the learning activities.

In this course, many learning activities are designed to foster collaborative learning in small groups. In order for the learner to develop the ability to think critically, reflect and integrate new information, the learner must engage in active dialogue with colleagues and the teacher. It is therefore to the learner's benefit that the he/she attends and participates in class regularly.
