I. PHILJOSOPHY/GORLS:

The purpose of this coirse is to prepare the student to use the nursing process in assisting clients to maintain and procnote adaptation. Nursing is viewed within the context of the adaptation conceptual framework. This involves detailed examination of the steps in the nursing process, assessment, planning, intervention and evaluation. Enphasis is given to the theory and skills necessary for effective cattnunication in promoting adaptation. The cognitive, affective and psychemotor demains of learning are involved throughout.

- 1) explain the relationship between adaptation and nursing practice in assisting clients *vjho* require support to maintain and promote adaptation.

- 8) apply knowledge of medical terminology in classroon and clinical practice.

3. Suppleroaital Examinaticffi;
