PREREQUISITEISI: HEALTH AND HEALING PRACTICUM I

L PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course will provide the student with a variety of gerontological nursing practice settings where they can interact with the well and frail elderly. The student will apply the theories and concepts examined and explored in the Health and Healing II course. Basic nursing skills will be practiced in the Health Sciences Resource Centre and applied to maintain and promote health with elderly individuals in the nursing practice setting.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Attendance for this course is mandatory. Students must participate in all activities organized in the nursing practice settings.

Upon completion of this course, the student will have:

- 1. practiced basic nursing skills safely and professionally.
- 2. practiced oral communication and interpersonal skills with the well and frail elderly.
- 3. integrated the theoretical concepts learned in Health and Healing II into the nursing practice setting using analytical skills.
- 4. developed a helping relationship with well and frail elderly to promote health and healing.
- 5. utilized assessment and health promotion tools for the gerontological individual.
- 6. communicates clearly, concisely and correctly in the written spoken and visual form that fulfills the purpose and meets the needs of audiences.
- 7. apply a wide variety of mathematical techniques with the dgree of accuracy required to solve problems and make decisions.
- 8. use a variety of computer hardware and software and other technological tools appropriate and necessary to the performance of tasks.
- 9. interact with others in groups or teams in ways that contribute to effective working relationships and the achievement of goals.
- 10. evaluate her or his own thinking throughout the steps and processes used in probten solving and decision making.
- 11. collect, analyze and organize relevant and necessary information from a variety of sources.
- 12. create innovative strategies and/or products that meet identified needs.
- 13. manage the use of time and other resources to attain personal and/or other project-related goals.
- 14. take responsibility for her or his own actions and decisions.
- 15. adapt to new situations and demands by applying and/or updating her or his knowledge and skills.
- 16. represent her or his skills, knowledge and experience realistically for personal and employment purposes.

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III. <u>TOPICS</u> IQ EE CQMEREB:

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The student will work with the well elderly in a community setting.

The focus will change to the frail elderly in a variety of nursing practice settings.

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Students will be assigned to a two-week consolidation period in an acute care setting.

The student will also be successfully critiqued on designated nursing skills in the Health Sciences Resource Centre.

The first 7 weeks have a community focus in which there will be 3 parts:

Part B: Gerontology Health Fair

Part C: Community Resource Learning Activity

Learning outcomes for this practical experience from Week 8-16 will be developed with your Practicum Mentor during Week 8. Please refer to your Interactive Review Process Booklet for information on developing Learning Outcomes. During Week 12, you will review your progress to date with your Practicum Mentor. The portfolio will be submitted for your final review during Week 16.
