PREREQUISITE(S): Secondary school diploma with grade 10 general mathematics is the minimum requirement. (grade 12 math is strongly recommended). Alternately, a combination of education and experience equal to the above.

To provide students with the background and academic training necessary to develop practical skills in the use of an IBM - PC for MS-DOS, Windows, and word-processing in preparation for the later use of integrated (industrial) software packages.
