# Integration Seminar

Total Credit Hours: 60

Prerequisite(s): Student must be on field placement

#### I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course provides an opportunity for students to share their experiences in field placement, to discuss current issues, and to apply and integrate course materials with field placement activities.

A group discussion format will be used. The instructor will meet with individual students on a scheduled basis to discuss personal concerns and issues.

A five day seminar will be held before placement to acquaint the student with processes, orient the student to the various agencies used, practice the F.I.T., and practice interviewing skills.

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Decide if that particular agency will be an option for a career choice.
- 2. Discuss current issues based on personal experience.
