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I. COURSE DESCRIPTION: In this course the student will gain an understanding of automotive and heavy duty electrical circuits, wiring diagrams, electro-magnetism and the use of applied test equipment. Construction and operating principals of starters and alternators will be discussed along with proper testing equipment and their uses. Electronic ignition system operation and design will be studied including manufacture maintenance and diagnostic procedures.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

- Outline the fundamentals of wiring diagrams

 Follow the flow of current through wiring diagrams to diagnose vehicle problems

<u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>: Explain the need for test equipment. List and describe four types of diagnostic test equipment Describe how a digital meter works and why it is needed for today's sensors and circuits

3. Connect and operate diagnostic test equipment

Potential Elements of the Performance: Test a wheel speed sensor using a lab scope

Perform assigned worksheets to measure Amps, Ohm's and Voltage using a digital meter.

Retrieve trouble codes using a scan tool

4. Describe the principals of operation and construction of starting and charging systems.

Potential Elements of the Performance: List the six major parts of an alternator. Explain full wave rectification Describe diode operation Explain the motor principle Draw and label a simple starting motor circuit Describe the operation of the starter drive and over running clutch

5. Test starting and charging system operation.

Potential Elements of the Performance: Test charging system output and compare to manufactures specifications Perform starter current draw Disassemble and inspect alternators and starters following manufactures procedures and test internal components. Explain the operation of a transistor

 Explain the operation and construction of ignition systems. <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>: Draw and label a simple ignition system. Explain magnetic induction. Identify parts of a spark plug. Connect an ignition scope to a vehicle to show ignition performance
