PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course is designed to provide the student with an overall introduction to the Native community and the larger social service community which provides service to Natives. This will be accomplished through active involvement in researching the various social service agencies and groups and attendance at various community events.

This course will provide the student with a general knowledge of the Native community and the non-Native social service community.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

The students will:

- 1. become aware of and involved in the local Native communities e.g. local First Nations, Indian Friendship Centre, Sault Tribe, Sault College N.S.A.
- 2. practice the communication and planning skills vital to successful involvement in human services.
- 3. keep complete and accurate records of community activities attended.
- 4. demonstrate motivation and commitment by organizing time to attend extra curricular activities related to this course.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

Student learning will be facilitated by lectures, group discussion and activity, guest speakers, audio-visuals, and field trips.

Include the following information in your presentation and paper:

- 1. Name of the agency and the name of the person interviewed.
- 2. Sources of funding .for the agency (municipal, provincial, or federal).
- 3. Ministry and legislation to which the agency is accountable.
- 4. Services provided.

- 5. Education background of the typical employee at the agency.
- 6. Working conditions -
- 7. Job prospects for graduates of N.C-W. Program.
- 8. What is this agency's connection with the Native community.
