This course is an intermediate course in conversation and pronunuciation using classroom participation through dialogues. It is geared for students who have a basic knowledge of Ojibway and who woftt to further develop that knowledge for personal use or in working with Native people

The course will primarily focus on intensive practice in conversation, and will include a study of the grammar of the language. Along with daily use and understanding of the language, cultural aspects will be emphasized.

When available, resource people will be invited from local reserves in order for students to be exposed to the different dialects of the langage. Also, a field trip to a cultural event [N-] be included as part of the course.

Class Participation (10%)

The participation mark will be based on oral performance in grammar, pronunciation, recollection of words in coversation seminars. For example, during warm-ups, students will be asked questions in connection with specific words, meanings, feelings, weather, time of day and days. Due to the nature of the language, it is essential that students attend class regularly. Attendance and participation will be monitored and records will be kept.

Written Assignments (10%)

Written assignments will consist of exercises, puzzles, quizzes, and dictation.

Tests (30%)

There will be two tests in class on the following dates

Test No. 1 September 28, 1990

Test No. 2 November 16, 1990

Mid Term Test (15%)

Mid-term test will be given October 19, 1990

Seminar (10%)

Students will be required to research and present stories (creative or true experiences), games, legends, plays, or songs using Ojibway vocabulary. Students are encouraged to develop visual aids to illustrate items/events such as the pipe, teepee, drum, traditional values, sweetgrass, ceremonies, etc., accompanied by a story, The purpose of the presentation is to expose students to the concept that Ianguage is a gift and a special way of looking at the native world view through the culture. The experience of an oral presentation should give the student a sense of pride and confidence in his/her Ojibway language skills.

The duration of the presentation should be approximately 10 minutes, followed by discussion. Topics will be chosen in class in mid October and the presentation dates will be scheduled for the weeks of December 13th, and December 20th, 1990. This assignment will be done in groups.
