Philosophy/Goals

The students of this course will come to understand the existing economic and social reality of Native people from the historical and cultural changes impacted by European contact and colonization- They will become familiar with the cultural and linguistic groups of Canada*s Native people leading up to more emphasis on Nations living within Ontario. This course will also examine contemporary issues that leaders of local reserves and Native organizations must deal with as well as the richness and complexity of Native life.

Course Objectives

- 1- To study. Native CQttures from a historical perspective and recognize how Native history has contributed to Canada's history.
- 2. To understand and become familiar with Anishnabe (Native) Lifeways
- 3. To identify and define existing social, economic and political structures of Native people nationally and locally.
- 4. To examine issues and social conditions experienced by Natives today.
- 5. To be familiar with local history of First Nations and the concept of Self-Government.
- 6- To develop an understanding of various legislations affecting Native people.
- 7. To develop research skills and analyze information on Native specific topics.

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Instructional Methods

A variety of methods will be used including: lecture presentation, group discussion, audio-visual presentation, guest speakers and field trips.
