PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

In this course, the student will be introduced to the study of Addictions. The class will explore general information about substances, their effects and the development of dependency. The impact of addiction on individuals, families and society will be examined. Treatment approaches and availability of resources will be discussed.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the nature of dependency including:
 - a. types and effects of substances;
 - b. theories of addiction.
- 2. Utilize the terminology related to the areas studied.
- 3. Identify the impact of addiction on individuals.
- 4. Identify the impact of addiction on families and the issues related to co-dependency
- 5. Discuss current social issues involving substance abuse.

TOPICS TO BE COVERED.

- 1. Drugs, their types and effects.
- 2. Development of dependency.
- 3. Theories of addiction.
- 4. Impact of addiction on the individual.
- 5. Co-dependency.
- 6. Addicted families.
- 7. Children from addicted families.
- 8. Social issues, such as:

Legalizing drugs; Drug-testing; Crack babies; Crime and violence.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES:

This course will consist of instructor presentations, group discussion, guest speakers, individual student presentation and audio/visual materials related to the topics covered.

- **A.** There will be two (2) terminology quizzes during the course. One quiz will be administered during the first half of the course and the second during the second half of course, after the mid-term period. The quizzes will be <u>brief</u> tests of the student's ability to retain the terminology used in the course material.
- B. There will be two (2) book reports to complete for this course. Each student is to select two books, preferably non-fiction, for supplementary reading. The first book should focus on one of the issues dealt with in the first half of the course. The second book should meet the same requirements but focus on an issue dealt with in the second half of the course. Each book **MUST** be approved by the instructor.

Students are expected to read these books on their own. Following completion of each book, students are to write a brief paper (3-5 typewritten pages) covering the following sections:

- 1. Brief summary of the book;
- 2. Summary of student's personal reaction to the book, with specific references to the book;
- 3. Summary of how information from class fits into the material presented in the book and if this has enhanced understanding of the material, how did it do so?

- C. There will be two (2) tests. The first test will cover the first half of the course. The second will deal with the family and social issues—the second half of the course.
