PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

In this subject the students will be introduced to the Canadian Native Peoples in both the historical and current perspectives. The major emphasis will be on the Nations living within Ontario.

The student will examine the current economic and social conditions of our Native people. They will become familiar with the concept of Indian Self-Government and Self-Determination.

This course would be of interest to individuals working within the helping professions to develop an understanding and appreciation of the Native individuals of families and communities that they may work with.

OBJECTIVES:

1. To be able to identify and define components of a traditional Native life-style.
2. To be introduced to the various legislations affecting the Native people of Canada.
3. To be able to identify and discuss the current issues challenging Native people.
4. To be able to discuss the current aspirations of the Native people nationally as well as locally.
5. To demonstrate an understanding of the concepts of Self-Government and Self-Determination.
6. To review local history of First Nations in the Algoma District.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

A variety of methods will be used including: lecture presentations, group discussion, audio-visual presentations, guest lecturers and field trips.

TOPICS:

1. Introduction:
 - Teacher/Student Introductions
 - Review Subject Outline
 - Discuss Subject Evaluation
 - DISCUSSION: Student/Instructor will exchange information related to the knowledge of and interest in the study of our Native peoples.
2. Examine the Life-style of Canada's Original Inhabitants;
 - Review the "creation" legend (theory) and compare to anthropological theory.
 - Review the "traditional" life-style.
3. Indian Organizations:
 - Development, History
4. Social Conditions:
 - Economic
 - Housing
 - Education
 - Social problems - alcoholism, child welfare
5. Self-Government:
 - Self-Determination
 - Examine the concept of Natives helping themselves
6. Field Trips:
 - this class will be expected to attend Native cultural/social/ political events - To be announced by the instructor
7. Guest Lecturers:
 - Various speakers will be invited to share their knowledge
