I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS

An addiction interferes with the healthy lifestyle of an individual, family and community. Students will gain an understanding of the impact on physical, mental, spiritual and emotional aspects related to the consequences of addictive behaviors.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Categorize and differentiate between the effects of various drugs.
- 2. Elaborate upon the relationship between the development of dependencies and the impact of addictions.
- 3. Compare and contrast theories of addiction currently accepted in the field.
- 4. Identify the impact of addictions on lifestyle, family dynamics and community life.

- 2. Development of physical and psychological dependency
- 3. Theories of addictions
- 4. Impact of addiction on individuals

V. METHOD OF EVALUATION

- A. There will be two tests. The first test will cover the first 3 topics: Development of Dependency, Major Categories of Drugs and Theories of Addictions. Test two will cover the second half of the course which deals with the Impact of Addictions on the Families and Co-dependency Behaviors, ACOA Issues. Tests CANNOT be rewritten to obtain a higher grade. Tests may be re-scheduled, at the instructor's discretion, for substantial and substantiated reasons for absence on that test day. Students who miss a test MUST make re-scheduling arrangements directly with the instructor AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
- B. There will be two book reports to complete for this course. Each student is to select two books, preferably non-fiction, for supplementary reading. The first book should focus on one of the issues dealt with in the first half of the course. The second book should meet the same requirements but focus on an issue dealt with in the second half of the course. Each book **must** be approved by the instructor. Students are expected to read these books on their own. Following completion of each book students are to write a brief paper (3-5 typewritten pages) covering the following sections:
 - 1. Brief summary of the book; (5%)
 - 2. Summary of students' reaction to the book, with specific references to the book; (5%)
 - 3. Summary of how information from the class fits into the material presented in the book and if this has enhanced understanding of the material, how did it do so? (5%)

- C. Presentation: Choose a topic related to the field of addictions. Make sure that you secure a topic early with your instructor as there will be no duplication of presentations This is an individual effort **NOT** a group activity. Research and organize an oral presentation of your topic. You will be allotted 15 minutes during the last three weeks of the course to present. You may choose to do your personal life story, your story must include specifics on how it relates to class information.

 - 2. Presentation of material 5%
 - 3. Content -(not repetitive of material already covered)- 5%

Total -15%

D. Attendance and Participation will be evaluated as follows: students will lose 1% per day of unexcused absence. At the end of the smester, if the student's active participation was above average => gain 1%; if student's active participation was average => no change; if student's active participation was below average => subtract 1% from Attendance Participation mark.
