PHILOSOPHY/GOALS

This course will examine the Native family as part of the universal social system.

We will explore the forces that challenge the traditional family responsibilities of meeting the basic survival and emotional needs of all its members, acting as the first level of socialization and social control and ensuring recognition and respect of kinship ties.

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OBJECTIVES

- 5. Knowledge of helping strategies for families in crisis.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS

Classroom presentations based on text and readings, audiovisuals, guest speakers and group discussions.

TIME FRAME

16 weeks - 3 hours per week

TOPICS

The course will be divided into 3 sections.

- 1. Traditional Family
- 2. Contemporary Family
- 3. Family Crisis

Due to overlap in subject areas these topics will not always be dealt with in isolated learning units.
