- 4. have a general knowledge of the services available to a family in crisis.

#### INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS;

Classroom presentations, guest speakers, group assignment, group discussions and community visits.

#### TOPICS:

- Municipal Minimum Standards By-Law, Licensing, Police Department, Fire Department, City Council.
- Provincial Ministry of Health, Human Rights, Ombudsman, Algoma Health Unit, Child & Family Service Act, Children's Aid Society, Crown Attorney.
- Federal Young Offenders Act, RCMP, Customs, Charter of Rights & Freedom

Note: Due to time constraints, these topics are not intended to be dealt with as isolated learning units.

16 weeks - 3 hours per week in class.
