PHILOSOPHY:

This section will focus on general conversational and pronunciation using classroom participation through dialogues. It is geared for students who have a basic knowledge of Ojibwe and who want to further develop that knowledge for personal use or in working with Native people. It is a continuation of Ojibwe (NSA 118). Concepts learned in NSA 118 will be elaborated.

The course will primarily focus on intensive practice in conversation and will include a study of the grammar of the language. Along with daily use and understanding of the language, cultural aspects will also be emphasized.

When available, resource people will be invited from local communities in order for students ^m be exposed to the different dialects of the language. Also, a field trip to a cultural eve^P maybe included as part of the course curriculum.

METHODS OF ASSESSMENT:

ASSIGNMENTS: (20%)

One major assignment is required; this will be conducted in three parts. The three parts will consist of reading, writing and speaking.

- (a) The students will present a tape recording of themselve (using a cassette), reading a story they have written.
- (b) To make a presentation on any unit of their choice, ex. making a booklet with the Ojibwe words.
- (c) To be able to do a public speaking presentation with an assigned topic.

QUIZZES: (30%)

A weekly guiz will be conducted, which will be 2% weekly for fifteen weeks.

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION: (30%)

The participation mark will be based on oral performance in grammar, pronunciation, recollection of words in conversation seminars. For example, during warm-ups, students will be asked questions in connection with specific words, meanings, feelings, weather, and time of day.

Due to the nature of the language it is essential that students attend class regularly. Attendance and participation will be monitored and records will be kept.

FINAL TEST: (10%)

A final oral test will consist of the general everyday vocabulary taught to date. Speaking, using the language that is taught will be reinforced.

LAB: (10%)

Reinforce the language that's been taught to date, using computers, games and related activities. This will strengthen vocabulary and pronunciation.
