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PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

FIELDWORK SEMINAR provides the student with the opportunity to meet as a group to discuss their Fieldwork (NSA 125-12) experience. The course is designed to facilitate their growth as competent workers by allowing them time to process their experiences under the guidance of their primary instructor.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The Student will:

1. Using the students field placement as references:
 - a) Share and compare the treatment philosophies of the agencies in which the students are working.
 - b) Evaluate their own work and attitudes on specific situations and with particular people.
2. Improve their observation skills and the way in which their observations are communicated.
3. Accurately assess situations in the decision-making process.
4. Develop and practice proper decision-making skills.
5. Practice in report writing.
6. Have increased and improved their interpersonal communicate in skills—particularly in giving and taking feedback.

3. The notebooks will be marked once a week.

This notebook should be a reflection of each student's personal experience on fieldwork placement and in seminar. It is not simply a factual report of the daily schedule of field placement.

SPECIAL NOTES:

Students with special needs, e.g. physical limitations, visual impairments, learning disability, are encouraged to discuss required accommodations confidentially with the instructor.

Your instructor reserves the right to modify the course as he/she deems necessary to meet the needs of the students.

All students must attend 70% of the classes to obtain a passing grade.

Typewritten (The Journal is not typed). Any late assignment **will** be penalized 1% per day late.

A passing grade must be obtained for both seminar classes and field placement or the student must repeat both courses.
