COURSE TITLE: Family Structure (NSAll1-3)

PmLOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course will examine the traditional Native family as part of the social system.

Additionally, we will explore the forces that challenge the traditional family. Also, an understanding of basic family structure and issues of families in crisis will be addressed.

SITUDENT PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES:

After successful completion of this course, the student will have:

- 1. Demonstrated a knowledge of the traditional way of family life.
- 2. Demonstrated a kno[^]edge of contemporary family life and the external and internal forces that challenge.
- 3« The skill to chart a genogram for an individual or family.
- 4. Developed an awareness of signs of stress In a family.
- 5. Demonstrated a knowledge of helping strate^es for families in crisis.

TOPICS:

This course will be diiided into three sections:

- 1. Traditional family
- 2. Contemporary family
- 3. Family Crisis

Due to overlap in subject areas, these topics will not always be dealt with in isolated learning units.

INSTRUCTIONAL MEIHODS:

Classroom presentations will be based on lecture, audio-visuals, guest speakers and group discussions.
