Course Description

You will be required to organize, plan and conduct a two hour Medicine Wheel workshop within your placement. This workshop is to be done in Ojibwe and English.

You will also be required to do a Poster project about your placement.

Phiiosophy/Goals

This course is designed to help the student to promote Ojibwe language and culture within the community. What the individual has learned over Semester I, II, and III will be put into practice.

- 1. Medicine Wheel Teachings both Ojibwe and English vocabulary.
- 2. Vocabulary, nouns, structure.
- 3. Cultural related teachings.
- 4. Understanding of the Language and appreciation of how rich and beautiful Native Language and Culture is.

The goals of this course are to motivate and stimulate the expression in Ojibwe Language and to promote its use within the communily. The course will promote pride in the Native culture as language is the basis of our way of life. Students will acquire an understanding of their cultural heritage, therefore fostering pride and developing a positive self-image.
