COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course requires you to promote Ojibwe language and culture in the community by applying the Ojibwe Language learned over Semester I, II and **ni**.

PHILOSOPHY/GOALS

This course is designed to help the student use and vmte Ojibwe language and culture whhout supervision. What the individual has learned over Semester I, n, and III will be put into practice in a semi-immersion class setting where students will have the opportunity to practise conversational Ojibwe between peers.

- 1. Vocabulary, nouns, structure.

- 3. Understanding of the Language and appreciation of how rich and beautiful Native Language and Culture is.

The goals of this course are to motivate and stimulate the expression in Ojibwe Language and to promote its use within the community. The course will promote pride in the Native culture as language is the basis of our way of life. Students will acquire an understanding of their cultural heritage, which will foster pride and develop a positive self-image.
