I. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is unique in its delivery to the students. Students will become immersed in speaking the Anishinaabemowin on a continual basis during course time. Daily activities, interactions with other participants and various activities will be in the Anishinaabemowin. Students are given the opportunity to participate with a lot of fun, humor and a sense of pride in learning this beautiful language. Students will be provided with the knowledge and skills in learning to converse in the language. Our goal is to regain and retain the Anishinaabemowin.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES AND ELEMENTS OF THE PERFORMANCE:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate the ability to:

- Potential Elements of the Performance: Will be able to converse key information about themselves in the Anishinaabemowin, By writing and repeating dialogue learned. This goal will be met with reinforcement activities.
- 2. <u>Potential Elements of the performance:</u> basic Anishinaabemowin in expressing how they feel, by doing activities By writing, speaking, and repeating dialogue learned.
- 3. <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>: Student will be able to say key words referring to Spiritual Anishinaabe words and other words referring to First Nations, leadership and community workers, By writing, and practicing dialogue learned in class. The Instructor will provide student with reinforcement activity
- 4. <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>: Student will be able to converse to describe what the weather like and how it effects them. The Instructor will provide each student with reinforcement activities
- 5. <u>Potential Elements of the Performance</u>: Student will be able to converse sentences they always wanted say in Anishinaabemowin.
 : By picking a saying they always wanted to say, the Instructor will provide each student with phrase reinforcement activities.
- 6. Potential Elements of the Performance: Students will know some Anishinaabe songs for their enjoyment.: By singing songs as a wrap-up at the end of each class.

III. TOPICS: 3 hours 5 - 30 minute units per class session

 - : Dialogue for Useful Words and Phrases: (Dialogue Practice)
 - : Spiritual words
 - : Terms and phrases used for First Nations, Leadership, Band Office, Anishinaabe Police, home, at the work place, and Entertainment
- 4. **(30 minutes)**
 - : Dialogue for Weather Expressions

Dialogue for: I want to say.

What you always wanted to say in Anishinaabemowin.
