I. PHILOSOPHY/GOALS:

This course includes a comprehensive study of major statutes, regulations and policies that affect management of wildlife, fisheries, Provincial and National parks, and other natural resource-related activities.

Enforcement procedures for investigating offences, collecting evidence and laying charges will be discussed. The emphasis will be on case studies, scenarios and role-playing activities. Guest speakers will assist in interpretation of key legislation.
